Office of Residential Living

This office provides students with a residential life program designed to enhance the academic experience. All on-campus housing locations have security coverage 24 hours a day. Visit www.drexel.edu/rlo for more information about the following residence halls:

- **Calhoun Hall, 3301 North Arch Street**
An eight-story building that houses 364 students. Every floor has two wings, each with its own kitchen, bathroom, laundry room, and a common study room. Calhoun also has a game room on the ground floor.
- **Caneris Hall, 115–125 North 32nd Street**
Caneris Hall houses 312 students in four- and six-person suites. Each suite includes a living room, bathroom, refrigerator/freezer, and sink. Full kitchens, study rooms, conference rooms, and floor lounges are located throughout the building.
- **Kelly Hall, 203 North 34th Street**
A 10-story building that houses 40 students on each floor. A multi-level lounge overlooks Philadelphia. The lower level offers a vending area, TV lounge, conference and study rooms, laundry facilities, and pool and Ping-Pong tables.
- **Myers Hall, 3301 Race Street**
A three-story building that houses 400 students. This residence hall is divided into 15 wings, each with its own kitchen, lounge, and bathroom. Each floor has coin-operated washers and dryers. All residents share a landscaped central courtyard, a bicycle storage room, a large TV lounge, and a recreation area.
- **North Hall, 33rd and Race Streets**
This residence hall was designed by world-renowned architect Michael Graves. It houses 500 students in four- and six-person suites; each suite features its own living room, bathroom, sink, and refrigerator/freezer. Vending areas, full kitchens, and laundry facilities are available on each floor. In addition, this residence hall offers a common recreational area, multipurpose rooms, study rooms, and conference rooms.
- **Race Street Hall, 33rd and Race Streets**
Each suite houses four students with two bedrooms, bath and toilet room, kitchenette and living area. The building consists of 12 floors, a capacity for 492 beds, two student lounges per floor, one large multipurpose room, a bicycle storage room, and laundry facilities.
- **Towers Hall, 101 North 34th Street**
A 15-story building that houses 32 students per floor. Each floor has a large lounge and kitchen. The second floor offers a game room, including Ping-Pong and pool tables, and laundry facilities. The Office of Residential Living is located on the first floor.
- **Van Rensselaer Hall, 3320 Powelton Avenue**
This residence hall features 11 floors of suite-style apartments housing three to four students each. Each suite has its own living room, bathroom, and kitchen. The basement level features a game room and a vending area.

Student Support Services

This OCA office helps students adjust to and succeed at Drexel through professional and peer academic counseling, tutoring, workshops, cultural activities, and pre-college summer programs.

Fraternity and Sorority Life

This department provides leadership, advisement, and educational programs for Drexel's Greek organizations. Approximately 800 students participate in Greek organizations, which include ten fraternities, five sororities, and eight bicultural chapters.
