

About Drexel

Drexel University is a private, nonsectarian coeducational university, founded in 1891 by financier and philanthropist Anthony J. Drexel. Today it is a top-tier, comprehensive research university, enrolling more than 13,000 undergraduates and 7,000 graduate, professional, and certificate students on four campuses and a center for graduate study. The University's 13 colleges and schools offer over 70 undergraduate majors, and more than 70 master's and 30 doctoral programs. Drexel is fully accredited by the Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools, with additional programs accredited by their respective top professional accreditation bodies. Students come from 48 U.S. states and 103 foreign countries.

Philadelphia

Philadelphia is the nation's sixth largest city, with a metropolitan population of nearly six million. It is renowned for its historical sites and the diversity of its neighborhoods, and as a hub of the pharmaceutical, electronics, and finance industries.

The city offers countless arts, entertainment, and recreational attractions including museums, theaters, major league sports franchises, and the nation's largest urban park system, as well as first-class shopping, dining, and nightlife.

Drexel's Main Campus is located in the University City neighborhood, which is also home to the University of Pennsylvania, the University of the Sciences, and the Restaurant School at Walnut Hill College. Most CNHP classes are held at the Center City Hahnemann Campus, situated in the heart of the city and in close proximity to a number of major teaching and research hospitals.

Admission

Acceptance for graduate study at Drexel University requires a bachelor's degree from an accredited institution in the United States or an equivalent international institution. Although admission requirements vary by program, regular acceptance typically requires a minimum grade point average (GPA) of 3.0 for the last two years of undergraduate work. The GPA for any graduate work must be at least 3.0. Applicants for post-master's status must show potential for further study by having maintained at least a 3.0 GPA in their master's-level studies. (Individual departmental requirements may exceed this minimum.)

The admissions committee evaluates all credentials submitted by applicants to determine a student's ability and potential to succeed in graduate study. In addition, the committee is interested in the applicant's ability to contribute to his/her program of study and to the University community as a whole.

Applicants may only apply to one program at a time. Drexel will waive the application fee if you apply online or submit your application during a campus visit. For more information, see www.drexel.edu/apply/cnhp.

Financing

Students must complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) to receive federal, state, or institutional aid. Students must complete this form annually to determine eligibility. Our History

CNHP was founded in 1969 as the College of Allied Health Professions with three degree programs and a faculty of five. In 2002, Drexel University merged with MCP Hahnemann University and assumed operation of its three schools – Medicine, Public Health, and CNHP. Today CNHP serves nearly 3,000 students and is fully accredited and widely renowned for its approach to education.

Faculty

CNHP faculty are affiliated with some of the finest hospitals and clinics in the country. They are innovators in interdisciplinary education, research, and practice in the service of communities, and they are dedicated to improving access to quality care as they educate the next generation of health professionals. CNHP supports faculty research that focuses on clinical practice and its outcomes. The range of faculty research reflects the diversity of their specific interests and the missions of our programs. University-wide, approximately 95 percent of full-time faculty members hold the PhD or highest degree in their field, and the student-to-faculty ratio is 10 to 1.

Couple and Family Therapy (MFT, PhD, PMC)

Our Master's in Family Therapy (MFT) and post-master's certificate in Couple and Family Therapy (PMC) programs prepare clinicians to meet the academic standards for independent practice and expose students to an array of classical and postmodern theories in family therapy by integrating person of the therapist, diversity, and social justice approaches. Both programs are accredited by the Commission of Accreditation for Marriage and Family Therapy Education (COAMFTE).

Our doctoral program in Couple and Family Therapy (PhD) prepares students for careers in academia, research, and behavioral healthcare. The education and training are comprised of theory, policy, clinical and supervisory skills, self of the therapist/professional development, and cultural awareness and sensitivity with an emphasis on social justice.

Our online certificate in Medical Family Therapy is designed to introduce a variety of currently practicing healthcare professionals to the ways acute and chronic medical illnesses and conditions influence and are influenced by psychosocial, relational, and family conditions and environments. Additionally, couple and family therapists and other professionals trained in the subspecialty of medical family therapy (or collaborative healthcare) will learn to work cooperatively to bridge gaps in the healthcare systems and provide comprehensive and culturally congruent family focused services.

Creative Arts Therapies (MA, PhD, PMC)

The Department of Creative Arts Therapies brings those who have an interest in the healing potential of the arts into the healthcare network by providing specialized clinical education and professional preparation in art therapy, dance/movement therapy, and music therapy. The curriculum includes course content in the mental health sciences, theory of human development and behavior, multiculturalism, theory of the creative arts therapies, research, ethics, and specialized courses for students in each discipline. Students participate in supervised practica and internships in a variety of medical, mental health, educational, and community settings with children and adults. These programs lead to eligibility for board certification exams and/or registration in the specialty. They also provide the academic and clinical requirements for licensure in professional counseling in many states. Part-time study is available.

Human Nutrition (MS)

The Master of Science in Human Nutrition Program, offered by the Nutrition Sciences Department, accommodates students who have a bachelor's degree and wish to become a registered dietitian (RD). Students can opt to pursue the Didactic Program in Dietetics (DPD) track or the Nutritional Sciences (NS) track. Study is offered on both a full-time and part-time basis with courses in the evening. DPD-track students will complete the degree as non-thesis students, while NS-track students have the option of thesis or no thesis.

Nursing (DrNP)

Drexel's Doctor of Nursing Practice (DrNP) degree is a hybrid professional doctorate, the only one of its kind in the U.S. With emphases on both advanced clinical practice and practical clinical research, this program offers Practitioner, Clinical Executive, Educator, and Clinical Scientist tracks. The degree can be completed in three years of part-time study, with the third year devoted to completion of a clinical dissertation. Classes are held Wednesday afternoons with two one-week summer residencies. The program also builds in a two-week study abroad experience in the second year.

Nursing (MSN)

The Master of Science in Nursing (MSN) programs prepare leaders in advanced practice roles. Nurses in advanced practice are professionals committed to delivering and improving high-quality service while shaping the healthcare system of the future. Courses from nursing and other disciplines provide advanced theoretical knowledge, assessment skills, role and leadership development, advanced practice in a selected specialization, and the opportunity to critique and apply nursing theory and research as a scientific basis for nursing practice. The department offers the MSN in the following specialties:

In addition, many of these are available as post-baccalaureate and/or post-master's certificate programs.

Physical Therapy and Rehabilitation Sciences (DPT, MHS, PBC, PhD)

Drexel's nationally-ranked Physical Therapy and Rehabilitation programs provide a rich environment for students to develop skill in evidence-based practice, teaching, medical informatics, research, and leadership. The department offers six programs: Professional Doctor of Physical Therapy (DPT), Post-Professional DPT, Certificate in Advanced Practice in Hand and Upper Quarter Rehabilitation, Certificate in Advanced Practice in Pediatric Rehabilitation, Master of Health Science (MHS), and PhD. Technology is infused throughout the curricula, making use of everything from iPod Touches to cutting-edge clinical simulation training to state-of-the-art research labs. Students have the opportunity to work with nationally and internationally recognized faculty members who have developed many local, national, and international clinical teaching and research collaborations.

Physician Assistant (MHS)

The Physician Assistant department offers a master of health science degree and a physician assistant post-professional master's program accredited by the Accreditation Review Commission on Education for the Physician Assistant, Inc. (ARC-PA). The programs prepare students to provide patient education and counseling, preventive intervention, complete or directed history taking and physical examination, diagnostic test evaluation, and presentation of cases in a problem-oriented fashion to a supervising physician; and to perform technical skills including electrocardiograms, venipuncture, suturing, casting, and injections. The programs aim to educate qualified primary care physician assistants, promote the physician assistant profession, and improve healthcare delivery in medically underserved urban and rural areas.

Facilities

The College of Nursing and Health Professions is located at Drexel University's Center City Hahnemann Campus, adjacent to Hahnemann University Hospital. Proximity to this major medical center provides a first-rate environment for study. The Clinical Learning Resource Center provides students with state-of-the-art educational resources to enable them to develop the skills they will need in their careers. Through the 11th Street Corridor Partnership for Community Based Care, the College of Nursing and Health Professions maintains a comprehensive, community-based health center, 11th Street Family Health Services Center of Drexel University, where students have unique opportunities to observe and be part of healthcare delivery.

Libraries

The Hahnemann Library, located on the Center City Campus, supports the curricula of the College of Nursing and Health Professions, College of Medicine, and the School of Public Health, including materials in clinical medicine and basic sciences, particularly physiology and pharmacology.

Audiovisual materials are available for viewing and listening at home, in fully equipped study carrels, and in group viewing rooms. Scanning; printing; and word processing, spreadsheet, presentation, and other software programs are available in the Computer Center. A large study area and various library computers, printers, and photocopiers are available 24 hours a day for use by University students, faculty, staff, and residents.

Drexel University has three other libraries: Hagerty Library and the College of Law Library, located on the University City Campus, and the Queen Lane Library, located on the College of Medicine Campus. Drexel graduate students also have access to the library resources of the University of Pennsylvania, the University of the Sciences in Philadelphia, and the Restaurant School at Walnut Hill College.
