I am a licensed marriage and family therapist and faculty member in the College of Nursing and Health Professions, Department of Couple and Family Therapy at Drexel University. I have more than 10 years of clinical, supervisory, and research experience. My clinical research considers how different relational and cultural contexts contribute to the experience of health disparities. Three main themes guide my clinical research: (1) improving providers' culturally sensitive and family-based clinical care; (2) improving collaborative interdisciplinary relationships to target health disparities; and (3) developing cross-cultural training curricula for healthcare providers to reduce health disparities. I currently study ethnic and racial minority families in which a parent and/or school-age child is coping with a physical illness (e.g., breast cancer in a parent and HIV/AIDS in school-age children).

Developing Culturally Sensitive Family-Based Interventions for School-age Children Coping with Parental Cancer

Goals:

The main purpose of this pilot study is to adapt a culturally and racially sensitive family-based clinical intervention for school-age children who are coping with a mother, father, or caregiver diagnosed with cancer. African American families in which a mother, father, or caregiver has been diagnosed with cancer within the past 12-months and there is at least one school-age child (ages 10-18) living in the home who has been told about the cancer diagnosis are included. The family-based clinical intervention, which has been developed from theoretical models and empirical studies available in the literature, is being compared to a psychoeducational approach. The family-based intervention is designed to improve parent and school-age child communication, quality of the relationships in the family, family routines, decrease symptoms of depression and anxiety in the school-age children and symptoms of depression in the parents.
