


BIOGRAPHIES OF PLENARY SPEAKERS

Joan B Gillece, PhD, is the Director of Trauma Informed Care and Alternatives to Seclusion and Restraint, National Association of State Mental Health Program Directors, Alexandria, VA. Dr. Gillece has thirty years of experience working in the behavioral health field with fifteen dedicated to trauma and six in prevention of seclusion and restraint. Working across agencies with a focus on adult and juvenile justice, she is developing trauma informed services in Correctional Settings. Dr. Gillece has championed the cause of full consumer integration and development of culturally competent programs using survivors in all aspects of trauma work. Prior to joining NASMHPD, Dr. Gillece served as Director of Special Populations for Maryland's Mental Hygiene Administration where her responsibilities included all aspects of state mental health planning and delivery of services as well as development of collaboration across agencies serving individuals with psychiatric diagnoses.

Ben Laudermilch has recently been appointed to the position of Executive Housing Director of the Department of Human Services. With too many Pennsylvanians living in facilities, facing homelessness, or unable to afford their rent, Ben will oversee the implementation of the Department's 5-year housing strategy. The goal is to leverage internal and external resources and to collaborate with all levels of government to make housing resources more accessible and available. This will help to connect Pennsylvanians with housing opportunities, expand affordable housing options, partner with local agencies, and pool resources. Prior to his appointment, Ben served as Executive Director of the Cumberland County Housing and Redevelopment Authorities and has more than 20 years of experience with community based organizations. Much of Ben's work has centered on local/regional planning initiatives and the development of a robust housing plans as well as the development of

low incoming housing tax credit projects and other community and economic development initiatives. He has also worked on several homeless initiatives across the country to develop housing and other opportunities for greater consumer self-sufficiency and economic growth.

Jonathan McVey serves as the Department of Human Services' Executive Housing Coordinator. In this role, works closely with staff within DHS and other agencies to implement DHS Five Year Housing Strategy and is responsible for a number of key housing initiatives including the Section 811 Project Rental Assistance Demonstration, a TANF Rapid Re-housing Demonstration, and a Strengthening Medicaid Housing Related Services and Supports Workgroup.

Jennifer Storm was nominated by Governor Tom Corbett as Commonwealth Victim Advocate on Nov. 8, 2013, and she was confirmed by the state Senate on Dec. 10, 2013, to serve a six-year term. As Victim Advocate, she is responsible for representing the rights and interests of crime victims before the Board of Probation and Parole and the Department of Corrections and to provide notification to crime victims of the potential for inmate release, opportunity to provide testimony, and notification of the inmate's movement within the correctional system. Further, Ms. Storm is responsible for advocating the interests of adult and juvenile crime victims throughout Pennsylvania. Prior to this appointment, Ms. Storm served for 10 years as executive director of the Dauphin County Victim/Witness Assistance Program, a non-profit organization which provides direct services to victims of crime, community outreach and training in victim's rights, and crisis response services. She has traveled the country giving keynotes, lectures, workshops, and panel discussions regarding victims' rights, LGBT rights, addiction and recovery, and civil rights.

Working Together for Women

Jordan Seidle, MBA, MA, LPC

Working Together for Women (WTW), a gender-sensitive, trauma-informed program was created in 2014 in Philadelphia, PA to provide addiction and psychiatric recovery-focused treatment combined with community-based outreach, peer support and case management for women being released from Philadelphia’s Riverside Correctional Facility. WTW’s goals are to help incarcerated women with a history of substance use disorders (~70%), many with coexisting psychiatric and medical disorders, navigate their challenging reentry and reintegration into the community, promote retention in addiction treatment, facilitate reunification with children/families, and reduce relapse and recidivism rates, up to 50% at two years for drug offenses alone.

Collaboration: The Essential Tools for Systems Change

The Forensic Interagency Task Force (FITF) was founded in 1996 by family members of individuals with mental illness who were in the criminal justice system. These family members were advocating for better treatment for their loved one both in the state and county prisons, as well as community alternatives to incarceration. This group was successful in bringing together officials from the state Departments of Corrections, Probation and Parole, Mental Health, as well as county mental health administrators, providers, and other interested parties. The FITF successfully initiated new programs, including those treating co-occurring disorders, and saw, in many cases for the first time, collaboration among parties as common goals were identified. The recent work of the FITF has been addressing reentry of persons from state prisons. This presentation will focus and highlight the "FITF reentry subcommittee" efforts and accomplishments.

Active Shooter! Active Shooter in the School! How You Can Predict, Prevent, Prepare, and Protect Your Children from the Unthinkable

Unfortunately, school shootings have become far too common in recent years. This presentation will first review what can be learned from the tragic events at Columbine High School, Virginia Tech University and Sandy Hook Elementary School. The presentation will introduce a four-phase model of Prediction (by means of specific "Red Flags"), Prevention (by means of immediate, anonymous notification), Preparation (by means of education and training) and finally Protection (in terms of physical plant modifications and procedural changes) in order to aid in preventing further such tragedies.
