Short Bio: Lynden Archer is the James A Friend Family Distinguished Professor of Chemical and Biomolecular Engineering at Cornell University. His research focuses on transport properties of polymers and polymer/particle hybrids, and their applications for electrochemical energy storage technology. Archer received his Ph.D. in chemical engineering from Stanford University in 1993 and the bachelor of science degree in chemical engineering (polymer science) from the University of Southern California in 1989. He is a fellow of the American Physical Society. His research contributions have been recognized with various awards, including the AICHE Nanoscale Science and Engineering Forum award, the National Science Foundation Award for Special Creativity, a NSF Distinguished Lectureship, and the American Institute of Chemical Engineer's MAC Centeniell Engineer award.
