## **RESEARCH GRANT PARTICIPATION**

### **Research Statement**

My research interests are in the social and psychological influences on inequitable distribution of chronic disease burden. My work uses multi-level spatially-integrated social theory to examine disparities in the experience of disease and illness, and to identify components of individual experiences which are tied to broader social explanations and influences. This perspective is then applied to specific questions of disease outcomes and treatment access. This work synthesizes the influences of ethnic, social and geographic context, organizational behavior and policy, culture and media, and individual physician and patient behaviors.

My primary focus has been in the area of cancer control, and spans the continuum of cancer control from primary prevention interventions to promote tobacco control and dietary change, to screening for early detection of breast, cervical, and oral cancers, to access to treatment, co-morbidity and survival outcomes. Other research in immunization and maternal and child health, chronic organ failure and transplantation, and HIV/AIDS also examines social and behavioral influences on disparities.

Key activities include:

Development of theory and methods to integrate spatial modeling of individual-level data with community-level behavioral and social indicators.

Mixed methodologies to contrast lived-experience perspectives with structural and environmental data.

The role of perceptions of relative disadvantage in health decision-making.

The contribution of social theory to investigations of diet, body size, and cancer across the lifecourse.
