
Bachelor of Science in General Studies



The ability to include minors as "stackable credentials" within the General Studies major can be of great value to working adults who are seeking advancement or a change in their employment. Students in the workforce looking to improve their earning potential often find that a degree makes them eligible for higherlevel positions within their organizations or others.

Select 36.0 credits from a range of humanities/social sciences subjects such as: anthropology, psychology, sociology, history, political science, philosophy, religion, literature, and fine arts (history or appreciated, not applied).

Courses from other areas require advisor approval.

WRITING-INTENSIVE (WI) COURSES REQUIREMENT

Students must pass three WI courses as a requirement for earning a General Studies degree.

UPPER-LEVEL COURSE REQUIREMENT

Students must pass 36 credits minimum of upper-level courses (typically, 300 level or higher) as a requirement for earning a General Studies degree.

FREE ELECTIVES 63 credits

SPECIALIZATION Devise Area of Study/Incorporate a Minor* 45 credits

The specialization is a set of courses built around a cohesive area of study in subjects such as business, client development & customer service, communication, psychology and much more. An academic advisor must pre-approve the specialization, which will not appear on the student's transcript.
