Drexel University, a private co-educational University founded in 1891, is located in the University City area of West Philadelphia, which abounds with a variety of cultural activities, museums, musical and theatrical centers. Drexel has been proud to call Philadelphia our hometown.

Philadelphia, the "City of Brotherly Love," holds a significant place in the birth of American independence. The Declaration of Independence and U.S. Constitution were both debated and signed here in Philadelphia. Drexel students can now be part of this rich history and vibrant culture.

Everything that Philadelphia has to offer is within distance. This is a hub for art enthusiasts, sports fans and cultural fanatics. Notably, Philadelphia is one of just a few cities with a professional franchise in five major league sports.

Campus Safety and Security

Philadelphia is the largest city in the State of Pennsylvania and the sixth most populous city in the US. As with other major metropolitan areas, it is important to take the necessary precautions to ensure your personal safety and security. This is a shared responsibility by our entire community. Drexel's Public Safety department, including the Drexel Police, and in coordination with the Philadelphia Police Department, works hard to educate the community about the resources and services available for incident prevention and reporting, safety tips, victim support, and emergency preparedness. Drexel's public spaces are intentionally designed to be well lit and animated at the street level at all times of day and feature "Blue Light" emergency direct-line telephones throughout our campuses for immediate assistance. Students, faculty, and staff are also encouraged to stay connected to Public Safety's 24/7 communications center by downloading the Drexel Guardian app and monitoring notifications provided by the DrexelALERT system. Students are also invited to utilize our Walking and Medical Escort services whenever they may feel unsafe or require assistance en route to a University-approved medical facility (in non-life-threatening medical situations).

Walking and Medical Escorts

Upon request, Public Safety security officers provide walking escorts for Drexel students, faculty and professional staff within our patrol boundaries: 30th to 36th streets and Chestnut to Spring Garden streets. This service is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. For more information and to request a walking escort:

The Department of Public Safety provides medical escorts for non-life-threatening medical conditions to University-approved hospitals, emergency rooms and healthcare centers. On-Campus and Off-Campus Housing

You are probably wondering if it is better to live on-campus or off-campus. There is no one right answer. It is easy to get housing on campus, if available. Most off-campus housing requires an established credit history and may require a hefty security deposit (an amount of money a tenant pays to a landlord or property manager when renting apartment or house and which covers damages, unpaid rent and in some instances, unpaid utilities). In addition, there are benefits of staying on campus. It may be located near your classes and less time to commute. Above all, it may provide you a better graduate experience since you are part of campus life, and the various social activities occur on campus.

Off-campus housing, on the other hand, can be more affordable. In general, off-campus housing is usually more spacious compared to dormitories. It is also typically easier to find a quiet space to get a break from Drexel. In an apartment building, you are likely to reside with a diverse mix of professionals, families, and non-students. When looking for off-campus housing, students have a variety of options and costs to consider in terms of location, convenience, type, condition of the space and size.

Students planning to live off-campus are encouraged to take advantage of the resources and services offered by Off-Campus Housing, which in partnership with <u>Apartments.com</u> provides access to a database of rental listings as well as useful information on the housing process.

African American Museum of Philadelphia



Penn's Landing

The Philadelphia Zoo

Eastern State Penitentiary

2027 Fairmount Ave, Philadelphia, PA 19130

Eastern State Penitentiary was once the most famous and expensive prison in the world but stands today in ruin, a haunting world of crumbling cellblocks and empty guard towers. Its vaulted, sky-lit cells once held many of America's most notorious criminals, including "Slick Willie" Sutton and "Scarface" Al Capone. Tours of this historic prison are held daily throughout the day and at twilight. Discounted admission is offered to current Drexel students (with a valid Dragoncard). The Free Library of Philadelphia

Parkway Central Library 1901 Vine Street Philadelphia, PA 19103

Throughout the City of Philadelphia, you will find many branches of the Free Library. They provide access to books and digital resources as well as lifelong learning opportunities that build literacy at all stages of life. They also have workshops for job seekers, cutting-edge Culinary Literacy Center, and other vital programs and resources regardless of your age and ability. This particular outpost is the closest to campus.

The Rosenbach Musuem and Library

2008-2010 Delancey Place Philadelphia, PA 19103

Located within two 19th-century townhouses, the Rosenbach offers exhibits, programs and tours showcasing rare books, manuscripts and art. A list of some of the treasures amassed by the Rosenbach brothers is amazing in itself – Lewis Carroll's own copy of *Alice in Wonderland*, a first edition of *Don Quixote*, James Joyce's handwritten manuscript for *Ulysses*, and the earliest extant letter from George Washington.

Get Your History Straight and Your Nightlife Gay

The LGBTQIA+ community in Philadelphia is a highly visible and important part of the city. Spanning several blocks just east of Broad Street in downtown Philadelphia, the Gayborhood is the center of Philadelphia's LGBTQ+ community.

Today, this early display of LGBTQ+ activism is commemorated with a historical marker at the corner of 5th and Chestnut Streets.

Other LGBTQ+ historical markers can be found in the city. There's one for Alain Locke, known as the "Father of the Harlem Renaissance" for promoting African American artists, writers, and musicians. Another one for Gloria Casarez, Latina lesbian civil rights leader and Philadelphia's first director of LGBT Affairs.



Quakers

Philadelphia is home to a ton of history and has earned several nicknames. One of them is "The Quaker City." The name is originated from its founding and settlement by the Religious Society of Friends, colloquially known as the "Quakers."

Free Quaker Meeting House

Located on 5th and Arch Streets, the Free Quaker Meeting House is an 18th-century structure with a story to tell about non-conformists, the intersection of religion and politics, and the power of community.

Mural Arts Philadelphia

The Colored Girls Museum (TCGM) is a memoir museum founded by Vashti DuBois that honors the stories, experiences, and history of ordinary Colored Girls. TCGM distinguishes itself by exclusively collecting, preserving, honoring, and decoding artifacts pertaining to the experience and the herstory of Colored Girls. This museum is also a research facility, exhibition space, gathering place and think tank. TCGM was founded in 2015 and is located in the historic neighborhood of Germantown in Philadelphia. Museum admission must be purchased in advance. Discounted tickets are available for Drexel students with an active DragonCard.





Mexican Cultural Center

The Mexican Cultural Center (MCC) is dedicated to promoting Mexico and its rich heritage, history, people, cuisine, and traditions. 

Transportation SEPTA

Southeastern Pennsylvania Transportation Authority (SEPTA) is Philadelphia's public transportation system that utilizes subways, trains, buses, and trolleys to take you wherever you want to go in the city and the surrounding suburbs. The fare is \$2.50 in cash (\$2.00 in contactless payment) around the city, or you can purchase a reloadable transit card (called a SEPTA Key) and use it throughout your time at Drexel. SEPTA Key cards can be purchased from kiosks at all SEPTA stations and can be used on subways, trolleys, buses, and regional rail lines. If you use a SEPTA Key card, the fare drops to \$2.00 per ride. If you do not want to purchase a key card, SEPTA also offers QuickTrip tickets starting at \$2.50 for one-way travel. Fares to the suburbs are higher and vary by zone and may require a separate ticket. Fares are subject to change.

Subways & Trollies

Market-Frankford Line (Subway) – Partially following Market Street east-west, this line, also known as "The El" or "Blue Line" goes from Frankford Transportation Center (east) to 69th Street (west) with stops near Drexel's campus (34th and Market Streets and 30th Street Station). The El has blue signs. Students who wish to travel to Center City and Old City will utilize the Eastbound train. For example, students who wish to travel to the suburb such as Delaware and Montgomery Counties (homes to many African restaurants and ethnic supermarkets) would take the Westbound train. From 69th Street, the high-speed line runs to Norristown and points in between.

Broad Street Line (Subway) – Following Broad Street north-south, it goes from Fern Rock Station (north) to AT&T Station (south). The Subway signs are orange.

Trolleys – There are five numbered trolley routes that begin and end at 13th and Market Streets which pass Drexel (33rd and Market Streets and 30th Street Station). Signs are green.


Regional Rail & Airport Line

Regional Rail – The Regional Rail provides train service to the surrounding suburbs from 30th Street Station, University City, Suburban Station, and Jefferson Station. The Airport Line goes to and from Center City every half hour.

Airport Line - Connects Philadelphia's International Airport Terminals to the major railroad transit hubs. The schedule is highly dependable and punctual and facilitates planning your trip to and from the airport at ease, especially with its fixed fare, in contrast to other taxi services whose fare and availability can vary based on demand.

PATCO


The PATCO (Port Authority Transit Corporation) Speedline serves southern New Jersey with nine rail stops between Lindenwold and City Hall in Camden, NJ. Riders can visit the Camden Aquarium, Camden's baseball park, and Freedom Morgage Pavillion to see a concert. Riders can receive discounts from select places by showing their Drexel ID and PATCO ticket. You can also take PATCO to four Philadelphia Rail Stops allowing you to transfer to the SEPTA Market-Frankford Line at 8th and Market.

Indego - Philly's Bike Share

Philadelphia continues to be one of the most bike-friendly cities in the country with the launch of its own bike sharing program called Indego in the spring of 2015. Indego allows visitors or members to rent bicycles from 70+ stations located across Philadelphia in Center City and parts of North, South, and West Philadelphia. Cyclists can walk up to any Indego station and check out bikes for quick trips around the city 24 hours a day, seven days a week, and the system allows users to return their bike rental to the nearest station after their ride is complete. Uber & Lyft

<u>Uber</u> and <u>Lyft</u> provide car ride services through their mobile phone apps. These are highly convenient since the fare is fixed by the app. These apps allow riders to put their pick-up location and destination in the app for a quick pick-up. These services are usually more economical than the traditional taxi rides.

That's why she and her team of licensed therapists offer a wide range of Black-focused therapy services — individual, marriage and family, and child/adolescent — with compassion, cultural awareness, and empathy.

Black Women's Health Alliance of Philadelphia

Formed in 1983 by a coalition of 100 Philadelphia women, the Black Women's Health Alliance seeks to improve healthcare and reduce health disparities for Black women and their families. Their programs include "Prime Time Sister Circle," which is a support group focused on stress management, fitness, and nutrition, as well as family leadership and teen dating violence prevention.

National Queer and Trans Therapists of Color Network

This healing justice organization seeks to provide mental health services and resources for queer and trans people of color across North America.

My Brother's Keeper (MBK) Cares

MBKCares, a support network for area residents, began in 2007 when founder Ihsan Hines lost his younger brother, Atif, to suicide. In pre-COVID times, the nonprofit hosted free monthly community nights in Cobbs Creek to discuss mental health and suicide prevention/awareness. Currently, MBKCares has been running weekly virtual conversations, ranging from parenting and finances to veterans and art therapy.

Melanin & Mental Health

Melanin & Mental Health is an online organization connecting Black and Latinx communities with culturally-competent clinicians. Their podcast, "Between Sessions," centers on mental health issues in communities of color.

Hike & Heal

Led by local wellness pro Brandi Nicole, Hike & Heal hosts private and group healing circles (and hikes, when it's safe to do so) focused on self-care and empowerment. This week's group event, "Hopeful and Healing Hours," is curated specifically for Black women to navigate current emotions and experiences via breath work, meditation, journaling, and mindful movement.



Money & Banking

There are many financial institutions around University City. Below is a list of nearby banks.

As a graduate student, you may need a bank account during your time at Drexel to pay utility bills (cell phone, gas, internet, electricity, and water) and/or receive funds from your employer. To sign up for a checking account, your bank will require you to appear in person, with the following documents to complete the procedure: Drexel photo identification card and authorized forms of ID such as a photo ID (or passport along with the I-20 for international students).

Direct deposit is the preferred method for receiving your student refund and pay stub. When you sign up for direct deposit, Drexel will deposit your student refund and/or paystub into the checking or savings account of your choice. The checking and savings account must be a (U.S.) bank account. If you do not have a (U.S.) bank account, you will need to establish one before you can enroll in direct deposit. They offer access to free, confidential consultations on writing projects, from interpreting assignments to planning to drafting and editing. They also provide individualized support for any task –assignments, personal statements, scholarly articles for publication and personal projects– from brainstorming to final revision. In addition, the center helps to integrate writing and the teaching of writing into the curriculum.
