Meenakshi Singh, MD, is the Vice Dean for Faculty Affairs and Faculty Development, and Professor and Chief Quality Officer for Anatomic Pathology at the State University of New York at Stony Brook, School of Medicine.

She received her Bachelor of Medicine and Surgery (MBBS) and her MD at Christian Medical College in Ludhiana, India. Her first position in the United States was at the AMC Cancer Research Center in Colorado. She completed a residency in Pathology at the University of Colorado Health Sciences Center and a Surgical Pathology Fellowship at the University of Iowa Hospital and Clinics in Iowa City, IA. She rose through the ranks to be a Professor of Pathology at the University of Colorado Denver. Five years ago, she was appointed the Vice Chair of Anatomic Pathology and became a tenured professor at Stony Brook University. One year ago she took on the institutional leadership role of Vice Dean.

Dr. Singh is a practicing surgical pathologist and cytopathologist with expertise in breast and gynecologic pathology and an active member of the multidisciplinary teams for breast and gynecologic cancers. She is the founding Director of the Selective Pathology Fellowship Program at her institution. This is an ACGME accredited program. She is the Co-Director of the Pathology Course for first year medical students at her university.
