Phyllis M. Wise, PhD, is an internationally respected leader in higher education and world renowned biomedical researcher. In 2017 she accepted the position of CEO and President of the Colorado Longitudinal Study, an ambitious project to create the largest repository in the world of biological specimens and corresponding data on the social determinants of health.

Harriet Hopf, MD, is Professor and Vice Chair for Faculty Development in the Department of Anesthesiology, Adjunct Professor of Bioengineering, and Senior Special Assistant in the Office of Faculty at the University of Utah. As the Director of the Women in Medicine and Science Program at the University of Utah from 2009 to 2012, Dr. Hopf created educational and interactive programs to enhance faculty recruitment, engagement, and retention.

Elizabeth L. Travis, PhD, FASTRO, is the Associate Vice President, Women and Minority Faculty Inclusion, and Mattie Allen Fair Professor in Cancer Research in the departments of Experimental Radiation Oncology and Pulmonary Medicine at The University of Texas MD Anderson Cancer Center. She is an internationally recognized scientist who has made significant contributions to our understanding of the effects of radiation on normal tissues in her 25 years in the field.

Ann Bonham, PhD, is a national thought leader and strategist for advancing the full spectrum medical research in the new healthcare environment. She has a long-standing commitment to patient and community engagement in research and healthcare, leadership development, and social justice.

Janis Orlowski, MD, is the chief health care officer at the Association of American Medical Colleges (AAMC) in Washington, D.C. She is board certified in both internal medicine and nephrology and specializes in acute renal care and transplantation.

Lilly Marks serves as Vice President for Health Affairs for the University of Colorado and Executive Vice Chancellor in charge of the Anschutz Medical Campus. She is a frequent national speaker on topics related to medical school economics, health care and clinical practice management, and leadership issues in academic medicine.

Ellen J. Bass, PhD, is the Chair of the Department of Health Systems and Services Research in the College of Nursing & Health Professions, a Professor in the Department of Information Science in the College of Computing & Informatics, and Affiliate Faculty in the School of Biomedical Engineering, Science and Health Systems at Drexel University.

Ann J. Brown, MD, MHS, is the Vice Dean for Faculty and Professor of Medicine with tenure at the Duke University School of Medicine. She leads the Office for Faculty, which provides extensive programming targeted to support faculty success.

Patricia A. Gabow, MD, was elected to the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation Board of Trustees in April 2013. Dr. Gabow is a national leader in delivery system innovation and the care of vulnerable populations. She retired in 2012 after 20 years as CEO of Denver Health'and Hospital Authority (DHHA), an integrated health care system serving one of the poorest populations in the state of Colorado.

Alda Maria Gonzaga MD, MS, FAAP, FACP, is the residency program director for internal medicine-pediatrics at UPMCME, an Advisory Dean at the University of Pittsburgh School of Medicine, and the chair of the Department of Medicine Diversity Committee. Her educational focus is on mentorship and faculty development around mentorship across differences.

Sharon Hull, MD, MPH, is Leadership Development Faculty Professor, Division Chief of Family Medicine, Duke University Medical Center. She is both as an experienced faculty member and leader, and an experienced coach to faculty. She has over 27 years of experience in academic medicine, as a clinician, educator, researcher and administrator.

Jean S. Kutner, MD, MSPH is Professor of Medicine and Associate Dean for Clinical Affairs, University of Colorado School of Medicine and Chief Medical Officer, University of Colorado Hospital. Her research focuses on improving symptoms and quality of life for patients with serious illness and their family caregivers.

Anne Libby, PhD, is Professor and Vice Chair for Academic Affairs in the Department of Emergency Medicine, University of Colorado School of Medicine at the Anschutz Medical Campus in Aurora, Colorado. Dr. Libby co-founded the Education, Training, and Career Development Core of the Colorado Clinical Translational Sciences Institute (CCTSI).

Diane Magrane, MD iis a professor of obstetrics and gynecology, Director Emerita of the Hedwig van Ameringen Executive Leadership in Academic Medicine (ELAM®) program for women faculty in the health sciences and the Founding Director of the Executive Leadership in Academic Technology and Engineering program (ELATE at Drexel®) for women faculty in STEM fields.

Page S. Morahan, PhD, is Founding Director of the Hedwig van Ameringen Executive Leadership in Academic Medicine ® Program for Women (ELAM®), and Co-Director of the Foundation for Advancement of International Medical Education and Research (FAIMER) Institutes.

Marsha D. Rappley, MD, is the Chief Executive Officer of Virginia Commonwealth University Health System and serves as VCU's Vice President for Health Sciences. She is a national leader in academic medicine, and served as chair of the board of directors of the Association of American Medical Colleges.

Judith G. Regensteiner, PhD is Professor of Medicine, a founder and director of the Center for Women's Health Research (CWHR), and the Judith and Joseph Wagner Chair in Women's Health Research. She trains and mentors young scientists in women's health and sex differences research, conducts research on diabetes and cardiovascular disease, and develops programs for the public and the medical community.

John Reilly, MD, is the Dean of the University of Colorado School of Medicine and Vice Chancellor for Health Affairs for the University of Colorado Anschutz Medical Campus. He holds the Richard D. Krugman Endowed Chair and joined the University in April 2015.

Sally A. Shumaker, PhD, is a tenured full professor in the Department of Social Sciences and Health Policy, the Division of Public Health Sciences, and the Department of Internal Medicine at the Wake Forest University School of Medicine. At Wake she has held a number of leadership positions, including founding Director of the WFUSM National Women's Health Center of Excellence and founding Chair of the Department of Social Sciences and Health Policy.

Roberta E. Sonnino, MD, is an executive and career coach with RES Coaching LLC, where she specializes in coaching individuals through career transitions, and in optimizing their options and performance in their current and/or new roles. She is a Professor of Pediatric Surgery (Retired) at Wayne State University and a Contributed Service Professor in the Center for Health Policy and Ethics at Creighton University.
