Methodology

Key

In the tables presented below, if a dollar figure for a program's **Local Estimate** has a symbol next to the dollar amount, it is an estimate. If there is no symbol, it is a hard figure that has already been publicly reported.

- If it has an asterisk (*), it is an estimate based on Philadelphia's share of the population of Pennsylvania, or the U.S.
- If it has a plus sign (+) it is an estimate based on Philadelphia's share of a similar program under the CARES Act or December 2020 Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act
- If it has two asterisks (**) it is an estimate based on the projected enrollment of that program, calculated using the expected added individual benefit available under ARPA
- If it has two plus signs (++) it is an estimate made specifically for that program, using available data

Clear Box = Automatic formula award estimate of funds that are relatively fixed

Shaded Box = Potential drawdown estimate of funds that will vary depending on the number of relief applications submitted by individuals or small businesses, tax credits claimed, reimbursements requested, or competitive grants secured.
