


Essential Workers in Philadelphia: Race/Ethnicity and Pay Food Service Workers in Philadelphia by Race and Ethnicity



On March 19, Governor Wolf declared that only life-sustaining industries could remain open. These industries are the life-sustaining industries with 15,000 or more employees in Philadelphia.

This dashboard shows where employees in these 4 essential industry sectors live in Philadelphia. Hover over the map to see information about each census tract.

You can look at individual industry sectors, or view multiple at a time. You can view all employees in these industry sectors, or see only employees earning less than \$1250 per month. \$1250 or less monthly roughly equals \$7.80 or less per hour for a full time worker.

Workers in these industries who earn less money are more likely to be frontline workers who were required to go into work in high-contact workplaces, increasing their risk of getting COVID-19 (https://econofact.org/essential-and-frontline-workers-inthe-covid-19-crisis).



Data Sources

Race/Ethnicity and Pay Dashboard:

The data come from the U.S. Census American Community Survey (ACS) Public Use Microdata Sample (PUMS) data, which take a sample of 1% of ACS data and weight it to create estimates. PUMS data is subject to increased sampling error because it only uses 1% of responses, and so these estimates may not be statistically reliable. You can view the PUMS data at https://data.census.gov/mdat/?#/.

These data are from the 2018 5-year estimate. The 5-year estimate averages data collected over a period of 5 years. The 2018 5-year estimate averages data collected between January 1, 2014 and December 31, 2018.

The industries on this dashboard are life-sustaining industries with over 15,000 employees in Philadelphia. Hourly pay is calculated to estimate the amount that a full-time worker would earn hourly at that annual pay.

Key Terms

Essential industries: Industries deemed essential during the COVID-19 pandemic which were allowed to remain open.

Essential workers: People who work in industries deemed essential during the COVID-19 pandemic. These workers may have been required to go into work, or may have been able to work from home.


Frontline workers: Essential workers who are unable to work from home and have been required to go into work during the COVID-19 pandemic, increasing their risk for contracting COVID-19.

Life-sustaining industry: Industries Pennsylvania Governor Tom Wolf permitted to stay open during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Industry sector: The Census' groupings of industries and industry groups into categories.
