

TERMS OF PROVISIONAL ADMISSION
Nursing Accelerated Career Entry (ACE) Program

Please review the following information regarding your provisional admission to the Nursing ACE program.

In order to start the program, you must complete the following items:

- Completion of all prerequisite courses (proof of completion must be provided by August 1 for fall entrance and January 15 for spring entrance).

A Transfer Credit Evaluation (TCE) form will be forwarded to you by the nursing department via email within two weeks of receiving your offer of admission letter. This form will tell you which courses have been accepted and which prerequisites still need to be completed.

Please contact the Office of Admissions if you will be unable to complete prerequisite coursework by the deadline or if you do not receive your TCE within the two-week period.

The eight prerequisites are as follows:

English	General Chemistry with lab
Developmental Psychology	Anatomy with lab (or A&P I with lab)
Human Nutrition	Physiology with lab (or A&P II with lab)
Statistics	Microbiology with lab

Anatomy, Physiology, and Microbiology must be taken within five years prior to enrollment in the Nursing ACE program. All other prerequisites must be taken within 10 years prior to enrollment in the Nursing ACE program. All science-based courses must be at least 4 semester credits and contain a lab component; all other courses must be at least 3 semester credits.

- Submission of an official transcript documenting receipt of your completed bachelor's degree with a cumulative GPA of 3.00 or better (August 1 for fall entrance and January 15 for spring entrance).
- Nursing students have additional compliance requirements to complete before starting the clinical portion of the program that include an extensive criminal background check and immunization documentation. Hepatitis B series and titer, a required immunization, can take months to complete. If you have not received this vaccine in the past, please start the series immediately. Please note that students are required to have a clear criminal history to attend clinical and complete the program. An official expunged record letter will be required if a student cannot meet this requirement. This could delay or prevent a student from starting the program at their anticipated start date. More information regarding clinical compliance requirements will be sent to enrolled students closer to the start of the term.
