Completing the unfinished business of women's equality is not a simple task. While Vision 2020's national reach provides resources and touchpoints in each state, managing collaboration among many groups all over the country has its challenges. Nothing can replace face-to-face meetings and planning sessions for action -- which is why the Vision 2020 National Congress is so important.

From September 27-29, Vision 2020 will convene its national coalition of Delegates and Allied Organizations from across the U.S. at the Miami Marriott Biscayne Bay. The Congress theme, "Paths to Shared Leadership," reflects a focus on the work to achieve Vision 2020's goal of 50-50 shared leadership among women and men in business and government.

Inside Drexel's Conversation on Women & Leadership

Women with sponsors are 27% more likely than their unsponsored female peers to ask for a raise and 22% more likely to ask for the "stretch assignments" that build their reputations as leaders.

Utah Delegate and Ally Help Pass Legislation to Include Suffragist Statue in D.C. in 2020

Better Days 2020, a Vision 2020 Allied Organization in Utah, has successfully led an effort to pass a resolution through the Utah legislature to send a statue of Martha Hughes Cannon -- the first female state senator anywhere in the U.S. -- to National Statuary Hall in the U.S. Capitol building in 2020.

"The Martha Hughes Cannon statue is part of a valuable effort identifying gaps between what we see in our public iconography, and what we value and hold dear," said Neylan McBaine, CEO of Better Days 2020 and a Vision 2020 Delegate. "If we truly do value women, their contributions to public and private life and to our modern culture, then we should have powerful visual reflections of that value in our public images."

In celebration of the news, Neylan shared the following facts about Martha Hughes Cannon:

- Martha worked as a typesetter at the Woman's Exponent, one of the longest running suffrage newspapers in the country.
- She earned four degrees before
 the age of 25, set up a private
 medical practice and became the resident physician at the woman-run Deseret Hospital in
 Salt Lake City.
- She testified about suffrage to U.S. congressional committees and was a featured speaker at national suffrage conventions.
- She authored Utah's sanitation laws, passed several legislative bills revolutionizing public health and founded Utah's first State Board of Health.


Nominate a Delegate!

Vision 2020 is growing its national network and is accepting nominations for new Delegates.


All applicants are welcome as long as they have demonstrated a commitment to advancing women and girls.



U.S. Senator Tammy Duckworth made history last week as she became the first senator to cast

a vote on the Senate floor with her newborn baby in her arms.

Her vote came one day after the Senate changed longstanding rules to allow newborns onto the Senate floor during votes for the first time. The rule change, voted through by unanimous consent, was done to accommodate senators with newborn babies, allowing them now to be able to bring a child under a year old onto the Senate floor and breastfeed them during votes.

When speaking with reporters, Duckworth said "It is about time, huh?" We couldn't agree more.
