Women's Equality Day is a nationally recognized day celebrated each year on August 26, the date on which the 19th Amendment became law 98 years ago, granting American women the right to vote. Here at Vision 2020, we host the annual Toast to Tenacity™ to honor the suffragists who fought for this right. We raise a glass of grape juice, as Alice Paul did when the Amendment was ratified in 1920 during Prohibition.

But [Alice Paul wasn't the only important activist and leader in the fight for the right to vote.](#) Her well-known story often overshadows the historical contributions of other suffragists, especially some women of color who championed both gender and racial equality.

California Delegates Team Up for Presentation at National Congress

Several Vision 2020 Delegates in California are collaborating to share a wide range of plans, programs and activities happening throughout the Golden State in honor of Women 100, Vision 2020's centennial celebration of the 19th Amendment in 2020.

Their work will be in collaboration with a diverse cross-section of organizations and individuals, including: American Medical Women's Association, National Association of Women Business Owners California, National Women's History Project (California Chapter), National Conference of Puerto Rican Woman (NCPRW) - SoCal, Ellevote Network for Women, Girl Scouts, Historical Societies, Women's Clubs and more.

Some of the activities include Dr. Sara Terheggen's Think Tank series (a Vision 2020 project), Anaida Colon-Muniz's work with the NCPRW in highlighting the suffrage movement in Puerto Rico, historical film screenings, encouraging women across California and the nation to march in July 4th parades in 2019 and 2020 while dressing as suffragists and carrying "Votes for Women" signs, engaging with their local communities to spread the word and join in the celebration, and much more that will be unveiled as we get closer to 2020!

Valoppi, a veteran TV news anchor and host in Miami, founded Women of Tomorrow with Browne, former CEO of Telemundo and a longtime supporter of women and minorities, in 1997. Today, the organization's Mentor & Scholarship Program works with 4,400 at-risk girls in close to 200 public high schools in South Florida, Detroit and Philadelphia.
